

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Track Overview

Purpose Statement


Witnessing communities are important to InterVarsity. In fact it's the lead of our purpose statement: "establish and advance witnessing communities". In alignment with our organizational purpose our hope for this track is to equip and send students to grow witnessing communities on their campus.

Track Description for students

We all get stuck in sharing our faith. We need each other's help.

In this track, we will look to see where God is at work in your story and in your circle of friends. We'll explore what it means to be a community that increasingly welcomes skeptics and seekers, and guides them in their journey with Jesus. We will show you ways to partner with leaders in your chapter to shape your community in becoming more outwardly focused and fruitful as witnesses together.

Join us as we practice being the vibrant witnessing community that we hope will become the "new normal" back on campus and beyond.





Retreat of Silence Guide (ROS)

Invite

Invite God to be with you during this time. Quiet yourself and take some time to relax. This could be a few moments, it could be an hour. Don't rush yourself. Let the worries and responsibilities of the school year drift away. Focus on where you are. Notice what's around you. Notice what you hear, see and smell. Bring your attention to the present moment – not finals or grades or what you're doing after CFW. But right here and right now. Take this time to be present with God. When you are ready, look over the reflection questions.

Reflect

Think over the past academic year. How did you experience God? In what ways did He meet you?

What did you learn about God? About yourself?

How are you feeling as you enter into Chapter Focus Week?



Consider

We're so glad that you are joining us in the Growing Witnessing Communities track this week. Together, we'll explore our experience of conversion communities, and learn how to partner with God and others in developing communities that reach out to new pockets of campus. Spend some time reflecting on what defines a conversion community.

What are some characteristics of a conversion community?

Have you been a part of a conversion community? What has your role been?

Read

Acts 1-2 describes the life of the early church. This new movement of believers was a great example of a conversion community. Read through these two chapters. Try to place yourself in the scenes described here. Invite God to highlight the things that He would like you to zoom in on.

Discover

How would you feel if you were to be given the task described in verse 8? How are we equipped for this task, according to the passage?

Who was involved in this community? How did they seem to get connected?



What was the motivation [vision] for this community? How did the vision play out in this passage?

Where do you see God at work in the midst of this new movement? What was the role of God?

What do you think it was like to be a part of this community?

Respond

Reflect on your characteristics of a conversion community. Is there anything that you might change or add because of your reflections on Acts 1-2?

How do you feel God is inviting you to participate in growing a conversion community?

Pray

Listen, giving God space to speak to you. Ask Him to highlight the things that He would have you take away from this time.

Close out your time by thanking God for this time and inviting Him to speak to your throughout this week.

Monday Quiet Time Guide

1. Reflect

What was your life like before you knew Jesus? Thank God for the transformations that he has made in your life. Invite the Holy Spirit to continue to make you more like him each day.

2. Read

Acts 9:1-22.

3. Discover

What has Saul been like before this point [7.53-8.3]?

Put yourself in Saul's shoes and read through 9.1-9 again. What might this experience be like? What do you see, smell, taste, hear, and feel?

How does Saul respond to Jesus? How do Saul's companions respond?

What is Saul like after his encounter with Jesus [v.20-21]?

4. Respond

Your experience of God is probably different from Paul's. Think through your own life story. How/when have you encountered God in your life?

Spend some time charting spiritual storyline with God.

5. Pray

Spend time praising God for revealing himself to you.



6. Acts 9:1-22

¹ Meanwhile Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest ² and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any who belonged to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. ³ Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. ⁴ He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?" ⁵ He asked, "Who are you, Lord?" The reply came, "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. ⁶ But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do." ⁷ The men who were traveling with him stood speechless because they heard the voice but saw no one. ⁸ Saul got up from the ground, and though his eyes were open, he could see nothing; so they led him by the hand and brought him into Damascus. ⁹ For three days he was without sight, and neither ate nor drank.

¹⁰ Now there was a disciple in Damascus named Ananias. The Lord said to him in a vision, "Ananias." He answered, "Here I am, Lord." ¹¹ The Lord said to him, "Get up and go to the street called Straight, and at the house of Judas look for a man of Tarsus named Saul. At this moment he is praying, ¹² and he has seen in a vision a man named Ananias come in and lay his hands on him so that he might regain his sight." ¹³ But Ananias answered, "Lord, I have heard from many about this man, how much evil he has done to your saints in Jerusalem; ¹⁴ and here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who invoke your name." ¹⁵ But the Lord said to him, "Go, for he is an instrument whom I have chosen to bring my name before Gentiles and kings and before the people of Israel; ¹⁶ I myself will show him how much he must suffer for the sake of my name." ¹⁷ So Ananias went and entered the house. He laid his hands on Saul and said, "Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus, who appeared to you on your way here, has sent me so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit." ¹⁸ And immediately something like scales fell from his eyes, and his sight was restored. Then he got up and was baptized, ¹⁹ and after taking some food, he regained his strength.

For several days he was with the disciples in Damascus, ²⁰ and immediately he began to proclaim Jesus in the synagogues, saying, "He is the Son of God." ²¹ All who heard him were amazed and said, "Is not this the man who made havoc in Jerusalem among those who invoked this name? And has he not come here for the purpose of bringing them bound before the chief priests?" ²² Saul became increasingly more powerful and confounded the Jews who lived in Damascus by proving that Jesus was the Messia



Tuesday Quiet Time Guide

1. Reflect

Often Jesus invites us to follow him into risk. Reflect on the last semester. What are some risks that Jesus invited you into? How did you respond to his invitations? What happened as a result?

2. Read

Acts 9:1-22

3. Discover

Compare Ananias' encounter with God [v.10-16] to Saul's [1-9].

What risk was God inviting Ananias into? Why do you think God included Ananias?

What was Ananias' initial response to God? What changes his response?

How does God show up in the midst of Ananias' obedience in following Him into risk?

4. Respond

What risks might God be inviting you into to this week? What risks back on campus could you take to help your small group grow into a conversion community?

5. Pray

Spend some time asking God to reveal a specific risk that He is inviting you into.



6. Acts 9:1-22

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Wednesday Quiet Time Guide

1. Reflect

Imagine one of your friends asked you what the gospel was, what would you say? What feelings come up as you imagine that experience?

2. Read

Acts 3

3. Discover

From verse 12 to the end of the chapter, Peter speaks to the crowd about Jesus. Looking at verses 13–15, contrast the titles Peter uses to designate Jesus with the horrendous ways the people treated him. What "excuse" do they have [verse 17]?

In verses 19–23, what does Peter say is a proper response to Jesus Christ? What are the benefits? What is the consequence if they do not respond positively?

While scanning through Peter's entire speech, pick out the promises that God had made through his servants. How has Jesus already fulfilled those promises? How is he fulfilling them presently? How will he fulfill them in the future?

4. Respond

When was the last time you shared the gospel with someone. How did it go? What did you learn about God? Yourself?

5. Pray

Thank God for the good news of the gospel. Ask him to reveal to you who he would have you share the gospel with this summer.



6. Acts 3

¹ One day Peter and John were going up to the temple at the hour of prayer, at three o'clock in the afternoon. ² And a man lame from birth was being carried in. People would lay him daily at the gate of the temple called the Beautiful Gate so that he could ask for alms from those entering the temple. ³ When he saw Peter and John about to go into the temple, he asked them for alms. ⁴ Peter looked intently at him, as did John, and said, "Look at us." ⁵ And he fixed his attention on them, expecting to receive something from them. ⁶ But Peter said, "I have no silver or gold, but what I have I give you; in the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, stand up and walk." ⁷ And he took him by the right hand and raised him up; and immediately his feet and ankles were made strong. ⁸ Jumping up, he stood and began to walk, and he entered the temple with them, walking and leaping and praising God. ⁹ All the people saw him walking and praising God, ¹⁰ and they recognized him as the one who used to sit and ask for alms at the Beautiful Gate of the temple; and they were filled with wonder and amazement at what had happened to him.

¹¹ While he clung to Peter and John, all the people ran together to them in the portico called Solomon's Portico, utterly astonished. ¹² When Peter saw it, he addressed the people, "You Israelites, why do you wonder at this, or why do you stare at us, as though by our own power or piety we had made him walk? ¹³ The God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, the God of our ancestors has glorified his servant Jesus, whom you handed over and rejected in the presence of Pilate, though he had decided to release him. ¹⁴ But you rejected the Holy and Righteous One and asked to have a murderer given to you, ¹⁵ and you killed the Author of life, whom God raised from the dead. To this we are witnesses. ¹⁶ And by faith in his name, his name itself has made this man strong, whom you see and know; and the faith that is through Jesus has given him this perfect health in the presence of all of you.

¹⁷ "And now, friends, I know that you acted in ignorance, as did also your rulers. ¹⁸ In this way God fulfilled what he had foretold through all the prophets, that his Messiah would suffer. ¹⁹ Repent therefore, and turn to God so that your sins may be wiped out, ²⁰ so that times of refreshing may come from the presence of the Lord, and that he may send the Messiah appointed for you, that is, Jesus, ²¹ who must remain in heaven until the time of universal restoration that God announced long ago through his holy prophets. ²² Moses said, 'The Lord your God will raise up for you from your own people a prophet like me. You must listen to whatever he tells you. ²³ And it will be that everyone who does not listen to that prophet will be utterly rooted out of the people.' ²⁴ And all the prophets, as many as have spoken, from Samuel and those after him, also predicted these days. ²⁵ You are the

descendants of the prophets and of the covenant that God gave to your ancestors, saying to Abraham, 'And in your descendants all the families of the earth shall be blessed.' ²⁶ When God raised up his servant, he sent him first to you, to bless you by turning each of you from your wicked ways."



Thursday Quiet Time Guide

1. Reflect

What would it look like to view your small group as a social resource you have to steward in order to "win" friends for Christ?

- 2. Read Luke 16:1-13
- 3. Discover

Ask God to reveal to you the things that He would have you learn from our time together today. What does the Holy Spirit highlighting?

Spend some time reflecting on the Lewin's Force Field Analysis for your community. How is God inviting you to be a driving force in your community?

4. Respond

What is your next step in becoming a shrewd influencer? Who do you need to talk with about this? Who else can you invite to be a driving force?

5. Pray

Ask God to reveal to you how he would like you to serve as a shrewd influencer in community. Ask for boldness and wisdom as you seek to shape your community toward becoming a conversion community.



6. Luke 16:1-13 [NRSV]

¹ Then Jesus said to the disciples, "There was a rich man who had a manager, and charges were brought to him that this man was squandering his property.² So he summoned him and said to him, 'What is this that I hear about you? Give me an accounting of your management, because you cannot be my manager any longer.' ³ Then the manager said to himself, 'What will I do, now that my master is taking the position away from me? I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg. ⁴ I have decided what to do so that, when I am dismissed as manager, people may welcome me into their homes.⁵ So, summoning his master's debtors one by one, he asked the first, 'How much do you owe my master?' ⁶ He answered, 'A hundred jugs of olive oil.' He said to him, 'Take your bill, sit down guickly, and make it fifty.' ⁷ Then he asked another, 'And how much do you owe?' He replied, 'A hundred containers of wheat.' He said to him, 'Take your bill and make it eighty.' ⁸ And his master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly; for the children of this age are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light.⁹ And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of dishonest wealth so that when it is gone, they may welcome you into the eternal homes.¹⁰ "Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much; and whoever is dishonest in a very little is dishonest also in much.¹¹ If then you have not been faithful with the dishonest wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? ¹² And if you have not been faithful with what belongs to another, who will give you what is your own? ¹³ No slave can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth."



Track Sessions

Sunday 4 PM

1. Session Goal

Our Goal is that each student leaving this track would be motivated, equipped and sent into mission. Below are three concrete goals to measure following CFW:

→ Motivated: Have you been praying for your non-Christian friends daily?

→ Equipped: Have you invited a friend to follow Jesus?

→ Sent: Have you used the 5 Thresholds video series? [e.g, church, friends, etc.] Why or why not?

2. Three Stages of Communities

Our focus is growing witnessing communities, not just doing evangelism as individuals. These are the three terms you will see in our curriculum, and we would like you to get comfortable with them. Our goal and prayer is that God would use the track to equip the participants to help their huddled small groups to become witnessing small groups, and then onto becoming conversion communities.

HUDDLED: These chapters and small groups exist for themselves. Evangelism is a concept. Conversions are rare (0 to 1 conversion per year.)

WITNESSING COMMUNITY: These chapters and small groups exist for others. Evangelism is part of their vision. They have been trained to do evangelism. And some of their efforts include witness. They see some conversions a year (4-8% of the chapter become new believers per year.)

CONVERSION COMMUNITY: Witness is integrated into all they do. Conversions are normal. (These chapters see 20%+ conversions per year.)

Mark 4:26-29



DEBRIEF & INTERPRET

OVERVIEW:

During your debrief, ask them if they want your feedback on their story. See if you can use the Thresholds language to make their stories more accessible.

SMALL GROUP QUESTIONS:

- What did you learn about telling your story?
- Where would you like some help in telling your story?

This week we will work on telling our stories, especially in light of the 5 Thresholds. Think through your own story, and be prepared to model for your Small Group how to interpret your story using the language of the 5 Thresholds.

2. Luke 15:11-32

¹¹Then Jesus said, "There was a man who had two sons. ¹²The younger of them said to his father, 'Father, give me the share of the property that will belong to me.' So he divided his property between them. ¹³A few days later the younger son gathered all he had and traveled to a distant country, and there he squandered his property in dissolute living. ¹⁴When he had spent everything, a severe famine took place throughout that country, and he began to be in need. ¹⁵So he went and hired himself out to one of the

citizens of that country, who sent him to his fields to feed the pigs. ¹⁶ He would gladly have filled himself with the pods that the pigs were eating; and no one gave him anything. ¹⁷ But when he came to himself he said, 'How many of my father's hired hands have bread enough and to spare, but here I am dying of hunger! ¹⁸ I will get up and go to my father, and I will say to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; ¹⁹ I am no longer worthy to be called your son; treat me like one of your hired hands."²⁰ So he set off and went to his father. But while he was still far off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion; he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him. ²¹ Then the son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son.'²² But the father said to his slaves, 'Quickly, bring out a robe—the best one—and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. ²³ And get the fatted calf and kill it, and let us eat and



celebrate; ²⁴ for this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found!' And they began to celebrate.²⁵ "Now his elder son was in the field; and when he came and approached the house, he heard music and dancing. ²⁶ He called one of the slaves and asked what was going on.²⁷ He replied, 'Your brother has come, and your father has killed the fatted calf, because he has got him back safe and sound."²⁸Then he became angry and refused to go in. His father came out and began to plead with him. ²⁹ But he answered his father, 'Listen! For all these years I have been working like a slave for you, and I have never disobeyed your command; yet you have never given me even a young goat so that I might celebrate with my friends. ³⁰ But when this son of yours came back, who has devoured your property with prostitutes, you killed the fatted calf for him!' ³¹Then the father said to him, 'Son, you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours. ³² But we had to celebrate and rejoice, because this brother of yours was dead and has come to life; he was lost and has been found.""

¹² Then Jesus said to his host, "When you give a luncheon or dinner, do not invite your friends, your brothers or sisters, your relatives, or your rich neighbors; if you do, they may invite you back and so you will be repaid. ¹³But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind, ¹⁴ and you will be blessed. Although they cannot repay you, you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous." ¹⁵When one of those at the table with him heard this, he said to Jesus, "Blessed are those who will eat at the feast in the kingdom of God." ¹⁶Jesus replied: "A certain man was preparing a great banguet and invited many guests. ¹⁷ At the time of the banguet he sent his servant to tell those who had been invited, 'Come, for everything is now ready.' ¹⁸"But they all alike began to make excuses. The first said, 'I have just bought a field, and I must go and see it. Please excuse me.' ¹⁹"Another said, 'I have just bought five yoke of oxen, and I'm on my way to try them out. Please excuse me.'²⁰"Still another said, 'I just got married, so I can't come.' ²¹"The servant came back and reported this to his master. Then the owner of the house became angry and ordered his servant, 'Go out quickly into the streets and alleys of the town and bring in the poor, the crippled, the blind and the lame.' ²²"'Sir,' the servant said, 'what you ordered has been done, but there is still room.' ²³"Then the master told his servant, 'Go out to the roads and country lanes and compel them to come in, so that my house will be full.²⁴ I tell you, not one of those who were invited will get a taste of my banguet."



INTERVARSITY

FIRST THRESHOLD: GROWING AS TRUST-BUILDERS

Trust-building as the foundation of being a spiritual friend.



OVERVIEW:

Some people are natural at trust-building. Keep encouraging them. Others need help with basic conversation skills and overcoming fears and barriers. Help them be more friendly.

SMALL GROUP QUESTIONS:

- With whom on your prayer map did you try to build trust with? What did you do? What did you learn about yourself?
- How would you like help in growing as a trust-builder?

RESPOND ACTIVELY

OVERVIEW:

Use prayer maps to see where each member can build trust. Have yours ready so your Small Group can see a practical example.

Teach the group how to do brief listening prayer for the people on their prayer map.

Help them name one practical step they can take this week.

SMALL GROUP QUESTIONS:

- Create a prayer map by writing down 3 or 4 networks where you have friends. Then write a few names near each network.
- Pray: God, please put the name of one friend on our hearts who does not know the love of God.
- Turn to your neighbor. Pray for each other, for the friend whom God brought to mind, and for an opportunity to build trust this week.

1. Rate Yourself as a Risk Taker

a. For each category pick the statement that fits your preferences best.

Physical world

- 1. Low-intensity activity such as a walk in the park or a stroll around a lake.
- 2. Medium-intensity such as hiking in the hills, water skiing, working out at the gym.
- 3. High-intensity activities such as bungee jumping, rock climbing, mountain biking, snow boarding.

Relationships

- 1. I don't really like meeting new people and I tend to avoid social situations.
- 2. I sometimes initiate conversation as long as I know the person.
- 3. I'm very outgoing and I like to meet new people.

Finances (imagine yourself as an investor, if you aren't already)

- 1. Conservative: If I were to invest my money in the market, I'd make low-risk choices, even if the opportunity for big gains is small.
- 2. Medium: I would take some level of risk in the market while still being safe with my money.
- 3. Risky: I would put my money in high-risk investments in order to maximize the possibilities of financial gain.

Career (imagine your future career preferences if you're not currently in a career)

- 1. I prefer a safe, quiet job that is predictable, orderly and conservative.
- 2. I'd like a job that presents opportunities for success even if there is also some chance of failure.
- 3. I'd love a high-risk job that rewards performance generously but also includes the risk of failure and loss of job (such as a sales job).

Scoring: Add together the numbers from all the categories and rate yourself as a risk-taker.

- Safe and secure: If you scored 4 or 5, you tend to be a conservative person who avoids risk.
- Moderate: If you scored 6-9, you are a medium risk taker. You will assume moderate risk for a chance at greater rewards.
- High-flyer: If you scored 10-12 you are a "go for it" kind of person who wants to score big rewards and is even willing to risk the possibility of utter failure in the process.

Share the results with your SG or a partner. Does this ring true with your personality? Why or why not? Do you think of yourself as a risk-taker?

¹¹ We set sail from Troas and took a straight course to Samothrace, the following day to Neapolis, ¹²and from there to Philippi, which is a leading city of the district of Macedonia and a Roman colony. 
OVERVIEW: Mark 10:46-52

SMALL GROUP QUESTIONS:

- What does this passage show us about Jesus and how he helps seekers?
- How can we be like Bart?
- How can we help seekers overcome their obstacles to finding Jesus?
- What are you learning about seekers?



This may be challenging for your folks. Please check in each of the the 7 days, even if just by text. They may easily get stuck,

confused, or discouraged that God didn't do what they hoped for.

SMALL GROUP QUESTIONS:

• How do you see God showing up for you? For your friend?

If they are stuck, help them interpret how they are learning to seek Jesus.

RESPOND ACTIVELY

OVERVIEW:

The 7-Day Prayer challenge is a practical opportunity to help our friends identify their deeper need for God. Have participants name a friend they will invite. Help them think about how to invite. Make sure they pray in person or via skype (not text). Help them ask deeper questions post-prayer.

The 7 day prayer challenge works 1-on-1, but it also is a great opportunity to invite other curious friends to join in.

SMALL GROUP INSTRUCTIONS:

We suggest you pray with your curious friends this way:

 "Jesus asks the blind man, 'What do you want me to do for you?' How about you? What do you want Jesus to do for you?" (Both of you pray honestly.)

After a few minutes, pray:

- "Jesus, teach us to seek you." Take a few minutes for (silent prayer).
- Share and pray together. Make sure to invite your friend to pray for you out loud as well.

Have a quick debrief with your friend:

• How were you aware of God's presence as we prayed?



2. Mark 10:46-52

⁴⁶ They came to Jericho. As he and his disciples and a large crowd were leaving Jericho, Bartimaeus son of Timaeus, a blind beggar, was sitting by the roadside. ⁴⁷ When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout out and say, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" ⁴⁸ Many sternly ordered him to be quiet, but he cried out even more loudly, "Son of David, have mercy on me!" ⁴⁹ Jesus stood still and said, "Call him here." And they called the blind man, saying to him, "Take heart; get up, he is calling you." ⁵⁰ So throwing off his cloak, he sprang up and came to Jesus. ⁵¹ Then Jesus said to him, "What do you want me to do for you?" The blind man said to him, "My teacher, let me see again." ⁵² Jesus said to him, "Go; your faith has made you well." Immediately he regained his sight and followed him on the way.

 - f. **Jesus' death** (crucifixion, owned our brokenness and death, took our punishment) Acts 3:13,15; Romans 5:6; 2 Corinthians 5:21; John 19:30
 - g. **Jesus' resurrection** (raised from the dead, conquered death, overcame the brokenness and death) Acts 3:15; Romans 6:8-10; 1 Corinthians 15:3-8,12-19; Luke 24:6-7
 - h. Invite a response
 - i. Repent (believe and turn from our way to his way, own our brokenness, ask for forgiveness) Acts 3:19; Isaiah 30:15; 1 John 1:9; Romans 10:9-13; Mark 1:15; Acts 17:30
 - **ii. Follow** (live through his power, lordship, be his hands and feet, sent together to heal) Acts 3:6-10; Ephesians 2:8-9; Matthew 28:19-20; Acts 4:32-35

1. Luke 16:1-15

¹ Then Jesus said to the disciples, "There was a rich man who had a manager, and charges were brought to him that this man was squandering his property.² So he summoned him and said to him, 'What is this that I hear about you? Give me an accounting of your management, because you cannot be my manager any longer."³ Then the manager said to himself, 'What will I do, now that my master is taking the position away from me? I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg. ⁴ I have decided what to do so that, when I am dismissed as manager, people may welcome me into their homes.' ⁵ So, summoning his master's debtors one by one, he asked the first, 'How much do you owe my master?' ⁶ He answered, 'A hundred jugs of olive oil.' He said to him, 'Take your bill, sit down guickly, and make it fifty.' ⁷ Then he asked another, 'And how much do you owe?' He replied, 'A hundred containers of wheat.' He said to him, 'Take your bill and make it eighty.' ⁸ And his master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly; for the children of this age are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light. ⁹ And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of dishonest wealth so that when it is gone, they may welcome you into the eternal homes. ¹⁰ "Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much; and whoever is dishonest in a very little is dishonest also in much.¹¹ If then you have not been faithful with the dishonest wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? ¹² And if you have not been faithful with what



belongs to another, who will give you what is your own? ¹³ No slave can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth." ¹⁴ The Pharisees, who were lovers of money, heard all this, and they ridiculed him. ¹⁵ So he said to them, "You are those who justify yourselves in the sight of others; but God knows your hearts; for what is prized by human beings is an abomination in the sight of God.

Shrewd influencers work with others to achieve their best. As you seek to partner with your small group leader, this model will typically help solve problems, make better decisions and train new skills. GROW is a proven model that emphasizes:

 $\mathsf{Goal} \rightarrow \mathsf{Reality} \rightarrow \mathsf{Options} \rightarrow \mathsf{Will}$

b. How to Use the GROW Tool

This resource is intended to spark a conversation about your small group between you and the leadership of your small group.

| Establish the Goal | Define and agree on a quantitative goal. Focus on specific, measurable and realistic outcomes. Explore questions such as: → What is your evangelistic goal for your small group over the year? → How many GIGs would you like to see begin through small group members? → How many people do you want to have made decisions to follow Jesus who are connected with your small group? → How many outreach events will your small group host to build trust with non-Christians on campus? |
