When God saw what they did, how they turned from their evil ways, God changed his mind about the calamity that he had said he would bring upon them; and he did not do it. **1** But this was very displeasing to Jonah, and he became angry. **2** He prayed to the Lord and said, 'O Lord! Is not this what I said while I was still in my own country? That is why I fled to Tarshish at the beginning; for I knew that **you are a gracious God** and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and ready to relent from punishing. **3** And now, O Lord, please take my life from me, for it is better for me to die than to live.'

5 Then Jonah went out of the city and sat down east of the city, and made a booth for himself there. What are Jonah's attitudes toward Nineveh?

- Judgmental – He would rather see the city destroyed than repenting and turning to God
- Angry - to see God being merciful
- Self-justified – he feels justified to tell God that he would rather die than see Nineveh repent

How does God feel toward Nineveh?

- Desires to show mercy
- Concern for the 120,000
- Sees their lostness that they "do not know their right hand from their left"
- Trying to help Jonah care about Nineveh the way he does

What does the scene with the bush reveal?

- Jonah cares more for a small insignificant bush than a whole city of people that God created and loves
- God not only loves the Ninevites, but he loves Jonah enough to take time to help Jonah understand his concern for them, and to invite him to feel the same way
