Acts 8:29-38 Then the Spirit said to Philip, 'Go over to this chariot and join it.' 30So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, 'Do you understand what you are reading?' 31He replied, 'How can I, unless someone guides me?' And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. 32Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this: 'Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth. 33In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth.' 34The eunuch asked Philip, 'About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?' 35Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. 36As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, 'Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?' 38He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. 39When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing.

Acts 26:12-18 'With this in mind, I was travelling to Damascus with the authority and commission of the chief priests, 13 when at midday along the road, your Excellency, I saw a light from heaven, brighter than the sun, shining around me and my companions. 14 When we had all fallen to the ground, I heard a voice saying to me in the Hebrew language, "Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me? It hurts you to kick against the goads." 15I asked, "Who are you, Lord?" The Lord answered, "I am Jesus whom you are persecuting. 16But get up and stand on your feet; for I have appeared to you for this purpose, to appoint you to serve and testify to the things in which you have seen me and to those in which I will appear to you. 17I will rescue you from your people and from the Gentiles—to whom I am sending you 18to open their eyes so that they may turn from darkness to light and from the power of Satan to God, so that they may receive forgiveness of sins and a place among those who are sanctified by faith in me."

Acts 10:30-33, 44-47 Cornelius replied, 'Four days ago at this very hour, at three o'clock, I was praying in my house when suddenly a man in dazzling clothes stood before me. 31He said, "Cornelius, your prayer has been heard and your alms have been remembered before God. 32Send therefore to Joppa and ask for Simon, who is called Peter; he is staying in the home of Simon, a tanner, by the sea." 33Therefore I sent for you immediately, and you have been kind enough to come. So now all of us are here in the presence of God to listen to all that the Lord has commanded you to say.' ...

44 While Peter was still speaking, the Holy Spirit fell upon all who heard the word. 45The circumcised believers who had come with Peter were astounded that the gift of the Holy Spirit had been poured out even on the Gentiles, 46for they heard them speaking in tongues and extolling God. Then Peter said, 47'Can anyone withhold the water for baptizing these people who have received the Holy Spirit just as we have?'





What do you notice about conversion in each of the passages?

Gordon Smith in *Beginning Well* defines conversion as a series of events that God uses to equip a person for a lifetime of transformation and mission. Smith suggests seven strands that a person must engage with or embrace for a "good conversion" to occur. He uses the word "strand" because it represents components of conversion that God has likely been building toward in one's life for years. The assumption is that God's grace is constantly at work in the lives of those not yet converted. Each strand is distinct but interrelated. The order and timing in which one embraces these components will be unique for each person and are not hoops to be jumped through. Usually a person will have an experience with one or more of the seven strands that creates a "tipping point, or moment that crystallizes their commitment to becoming a follower of Jesus. There are "little c" and "Big C" conversions along the way that signify that something profound has happened in that person's journey toward Christ.

Journal Suggestion

It is helpful to be in touch with the full breadth of our own journey of conversion. Most, when asked about their story, recall only a narrow portion. The more we are know about how God has worked in our lives, the better we will be at discerning his work in others – and calling their attention to it. Can we describe in our own journeys where we have seen these seven strands? Smith encourages us to write a spiritual autobiography.



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Acts 8—Eunuch admits he doesn't understand and needs clarity—an intellectual understanding is needed; sacremental-water baptism; emotional--joy

Acts 26: Clarity about what Paul is doing wrong, persecuting Jesus, but done with Paul's best in mind. He is being rescued. God wants Paul's allegiance for Paul's sake and also for the sake of the Kingdom—the Gentile community.

Acts 10: Clarity and understanding-- Cornelius speaking about God's preparation of his heart; The Holy Spirit's empowerment--charismatic; community b/w Jews and Gentiles; baptism:
