What is the relationship between elders, the flock, and the Chief shepherd?

Elders have been entrusted to care for God's flock. The elders are stewards, appointed to lead and care for those who belong to Jesus. In actuality they are undershepherds. Jesus is the Chief Shepherd and we are all (elders included) members of his flock. Elders who faithfully fulfill their role as shepherds of Jesus' flock will be rewarded by Jesus when he returns. Jesus rewards his faithful undershepherds by sharing with them his own unfading glory.

What are the characteristics of a faithful elder according to Peter? What does Peter contrast those characteristics with?

One who accepts and takes on the role willingly, Is eager to serve the flock, and leads by example as opposed to one who is reluctantly compelled, is motivated by selfish interest, and wields their authority in a heavy handed fashion.

How do Peter's experiences and perspectives influence his paradigm for Christian leadership?

Peter has been shaped by the model of leadership embodied in Jesus. Jesus was the ultimate shepherd who willingly poured his life out for the sake of the flock, who led by serving those around him, and who lived his life as an example for his followers to emulate. Elders who faithfully follow Jesus' example will be rewarded by Jesus when he returns by sharing with them his own unfading glory.

	Willingness	Love being with the flock, eagerness to go above and beyond, sees leadership role as a blessing,.	Feel loved and cared for by their leader. Feel free to make their needs known, positively affects their view of God and of leadership.
Motivation	Selfish Interest	Egocentric, manipulative, deceitful, focused on what they can get out of the leadership role, unwilling to sacrifice or pay costs for the sake of the flock	End up feeling used or manipulated instead of needs getting met., feel resentful or bitter towards leader, negatively effects view of God and leadership.

The promise of our future reward of the crown of glory and of Christ's favor motivates us to embody the positive characteristics described by Peter and modeled to us by Jesus himself.
